Blessings Over Enjoyment

The blessings we recite before eating food are called *birkhot hanehenin*, literally "blessings over things that bring enjoyment." That term indicates the central importance of the concept of hana'ah, "enjoyment," "pleasure," or "benefit": We recite blessings as an expression of gratitude to God for deriving benefit from God's world.

The recitation of blessings before eating food is a crucial institution and a comprehensive system in rabbinic Judaism. We can find the theology behind the requirement to recite a *berakhah* over food within the book of Deuteronomy, which states that God is the source of food in the world:

"Look down from Your holy abode, from heaven, and bless Your people Israel and the soil You have given us..." Deuteronomy 26:15

Therefore a person must thank God for the Divine bounty.

As the Rabbis teach, "It is forbidden to derive benefit/pleasure (hana'ah) from the world without reciting a *berakhah*." B. Berakhot 35a

But precisely how do we derive this *hana'ah*? The halakhic authorities ultimately rule that we derive hana'ah through: the act of *akhilah* ("eating"). Therefore, prior to eating, we recite benedictions.

We are familiar with many of these six blessings: *Ha-Motzi, Mezonot, Ha-gefen, Ha-`etz, Ha-'adama,* and *She-ha-kol*.

However, as the Talmud explains, there is an additional way through which we physically experience the enjoyment of God's world:

Rav Yehuda said: One who goes out during Nisan [Maimonides adds: "or in any season] and sees trees that are blossoming recites: Blessed...who has withheld nothing from His world, and has created in it beautiful creatures and trees for human beings to enjoy. - Berakhot 43b:3

The rabbis are conflicted about Rav Yehudah's blessing because the prayers of enjoyment are primarily expressions of gratitude for that which benefits the body. But, on the other hand, Rav Yehudah asserts that prayers of pleasure also express gratitude for sights, sounds, and smells. So how can the rabbis rectify the two opinions?

Rav Zutra bar Toviya provides this verse from Psalm 150:6: "Let every soul praise the Lord" (Psalms 150:6). Following which he explains:

What is it from which the soul derives benefit, and the body does not derive benefit from it? You must say: That is the scent. Even over items from which only the soul derives benefit, one must recite a blessing and praise God.

There is much for our souls to celebrate during this season. We rejoice in the warm weather, reunions, returning to the synagogue, and the beautiful growth that permeates our landscape.

Let us share in the prayer of gratitude that Maimonides (1138–1204 CE) adapted from Rav Yehudah:

"Blessed are You, Lord our God, Sovereign of the Universe, Who has made Your world lacking in nothing, and has produced therein goodly creatures and good and beautiful trees wherewith to delight the children of humanity."

How good are your tents Jacob your dwelling places Israel!

These words come to us from the Torah portion parhsat Balak, which is

named after the Moabite king Balak who enticed the prophet Balam to curse the Israelites. In the parsha, impressed by the sight of the Israelite camp (and as guided by God) Balam could not utter the curse and uttered the blessing instead.

This blessing has since become a part of the ritual text, recited by the Ashkenazi Jews upon first entering the synagogue sanctuary and before the formal prayers begin.

I thought of this blessing when I entered our sanctuary last Saturday morning and saw many of our congregants in their usual seats talking to one another, singing and praying as a community.

It was a sight that we all longed for to see in the past 15 months of this pandemic and especially during the last couple of months when we began to open up our building and welcome our people back.

JEWISH HOLIDAY LAB

Cantor Roytman and I have been fine-tuning one of the basic components of the BHBE Academy, as part of our live regathering for this fall, and refocusing as the **Jewish Holiday Lab**.

The concept...

A heart of Judaism is **celebratory experience**, in the form of lifecycle and holiday ceremony. Three or four times per year, the community gathers for robust holiday celebrations, facilitated by the students in the Academy and incorporating parents and special guests. Students spend time on Sundays over several weeks preparing for each of these gatherings.

Students begin by studying the holiday's key themes, principles, rituals, and texts. They then interpret, expand upon, and personalize these understandings through the creation of projects that are artistic, intellectual, spiritual, and ethical.

Finally, they bring what they have created to the community, as a culminating project and as the facilitators of a memorable celebration. In this way, they cement their knowledge and develop a richer understanding of Jewish ritual and life.

Some of the areas of investigation are...

- **1. Social Justice initiatives**, related by theme to the holiday, incorporating tzedakah, pikuach nefesh, bikkur cholem, and more.
- **2.** Artistic explorations of the holiday through the creation and performance of plays, music, art, video, dance, and literature.
- **3. Intellectual explorations of key holiday themes**, through essays, slide presentations, dialogues, and podcasts.
- **4. Ritual familiarity and skill,** through the study and singing of key holiday prayers and texts.
- **5.** Culinary Connections, through the preparation of holiday foods that originate in Jewish communities around the world.
- **6. Parallel Parent Study**. The Rabbi teaches parents about the history and rituals of the holiday during regular parent educational gatherings.

Here is a Hanukkah example of what one Jewish Holiday Lab culminating ceremony would look like...

Eight Candles are lit, each one followed by a short performance or presentation.

- 1. Candle of Justice. Academy class introduces the Tikkun Olam project they have worked on for the last two months, thematically connected to the holiday. They involve the audience in a final aspect of the project.
- **2.** Candle of History. The Theater Group presents a short play that they have written and rehearsed about the history of Hanukkah.
- **3. Candle of Tradition.** The choir, conducted by the cantor, sings several unique Hanukkah songs and leads a sing-along.
- **4. Candle of Connection.** An Academy class presents a slide show about the ways Jewish communities celebrate Hanukkah around the world.
- **5.** Candle of Creativity. A Hanukkah-themed art exhibit is displayed around the hall, using different mediums and interpreting key aspects of the holiday's themes and rituals.
- **6. Candle of Celebration.** Grades K 2 performs two Hanukkah dances.
- **7. Candle of Knowledge.** The rabbi teaches a key element from the study sessions about Hanukkah that he has facilitated for parents.
- **8.** Candle of Community. Students lead the community in the official lighting of the candles, including Maoz Tzur and Haneirot Halalu, which they have learned and polished.

The Festive Meal. The student cooking group introduces the Hanukkah recipes they have prepared, which are available to sample in the buffet that follows the ceremony!

Gardner; and *God Bless America: The Story of an Immigrant Named Irving Berlin* by Adah Nuchi, illustrated by Rob Polivka.


Sticking with the musical theme, here are some other titles featuring Jewish American composers:



Irving Berlin: New York Genius by James Kaplan (2019)

Irving Berlin (1888–1989) has been called -by George Gershwin, among others -- the greatest songwriter of the golden age of the American popular song. "Berlin has no place in American music," legendary composer

Jerome Kern wrote, "he is American music." In a career that spanned an astonishing nine decades, Berlin wrote some fifteen hundred tunes. From ragtime to the rock era, Berlin's work has endured in the very fiber of American national identity. Exploring the interplay of Berlin's life with the life of New York City, noted biographer James Kaplan offers a visceral narrative of Berlin as self-made man and witty, wily, tough Jewish immigrant. This fast-paced, musically opinionated biography uncovers Berlin's unique brilliance as a composer of music and lyrics. "Propulsive and appealing." (*Wall Street Journal*)



Rhapsody by Mitchell James Kaplan (2021) One evening in 1924, Katharine "Kay" Swift -- the restless but loyal society wife of wealthy banker James Warburg and a serious pianist who longs for recognition -- attends a concert. The piece: "Rhapsody in Blue." The composer: a brilliant, elusive young musical genius

named George Gershwin. Kay is transfixed, helpless to resist the magnetic pull of George's talent, charm, and swagger. Their ten-year love affair, complicated by her conflicted loyalty to her husband and the twists and turns of her own musical career, ends only with George's death from a brain tumor at the age of thirty-eight. Set in Jazz Age New York City, this work of fiction explores the timeless bond between two brilliant, strong-willed artists. "A sumptuous fictional account of a complex real-life romance." (*Booklist*)



The Man That Got Away: The Life and Songs of Harold Arlen by Walter Rimler (2015)

"Over the Rainbow," "Stormy Weather," and "One for My Baby" are just a few of Harold Arlen's well-loved compositions. Yet his name is hardly known -- except to the musicians who venerate him. At a gathering of songwriters

George Gershwin called him "the best of us." Irving Berlin agreed. Paul McCartney sent him a fan letter and became his publisher. Bob Dylan wrote of his fascination with Arlen's "bittersweet, lonely world." A cantor's son, Arlen believed his music was from a place outside himself, a place that also sent tragedy. When his wife became mentally ill and was institutionalized, he turned to alcohol. It nearly killed him. But the beautiful songs kept coming. Walter Rimler drew on interviews with friends and associates of Arlen and on newly available archives to write this intimate portrait of a genius whose work is a pillar of the Great American Songbook. "Tells an important story and presents musical analysis of Arlen's compositional style in nonacademic terms, so that all readers can grasp how inventive Arlen really was."(Wall Street Journal)



Music Was IT: Young Leonard Bernstein by Susan Goldman Rubin (2011)

When Lenny was two years old, his mother found that the only way to soothe her crying son was to turn on the Victrola. When his aunt passed on her piano to Lenny's parents, the boy demanded lessons. When Lenny went to school, he

had the most fun during "singing hours." But Lenny's love of music was met with opposition from the start. Lenny's father, a successful businessman, wanted Lenny to follow in his footsteps. Additionally, the classical music world of the 1930s and 1940s was dominated by Europeans -- no American Jewish kid had a serious chance to make a name for himself in this field. Beginning with Lenny's childhood in Boston and ending with his triumphant conducting debut at Carnegie Hall with the New York Philharmonic when he was just twenty-five, Music Was IT draws readers into the energetic, passionate, challenging, music-filled life of young Leonard Bernstein. 
