We concluded the reading of the Book of Genesis with the narrative of Jacob's final days. Essential to the story is the account of the large caravan Joseph led from Egypt to Canaan. Joseph was on a holy mission to lay Jacob to rest in the family sepulcher in Hebron.

As Joseph and the caravan traveled closer to Hebron, Joseph reencountered the pit into which his brothers cast him many years before. The rabbis teach that Joseph suffered in that barren hole for three days, after which he was retrieved by traveling tradespeople and brought to Egypt. There, despite trials and tribulations, Joseph rose to the very heights of the Egyptian government, only second in importance to the Pharoah.

Therefore, a visit to the scene of Joseph's Egyptian origin story, the pit, was rife with complicated memories and emotions. According to the Talmud, Joseph exited the caravan and stood in private meditation at the hole's edge. His brothers were fearful that his resentment and anger were growing, and given Joseph's great power in Egypt, he could have punished the brothers beyond measure for their great betrayal.

However, according to the Talmudic account, Joseph was not plotting revenge; instead, he offered a prayer to the Divine in gratitude for rescuing him and enabling Joseph to emerge from the pit to a life of significant power and fulfillment. His prayer was: "Blessed be G-d who wrought miracles for our ancestors in this place."

His visit to this space of memory ignited within Joseph a prayer of gratitude, nourishing Joseph's appreciation for the exceptional moments that led him to his current status in society and life.

As individuals, we have places and avenues associated with critical positive events in our lives. It may be the space of marriage proposal or the site a significant accomplishment by our children. Essentially, any space in which life changed for the better. Whenever we touch the past, we are strengthened by yesterday's achievements and nourished by their memories.

As we prepare to enter a new secular calendar year, with its potential tremendous challenges, may we be blessed with opportunities to reflect upon yesterday's heights, looking forward with a prayer in our souls for a secular new year of strength, health, peace, and joy.



Squirrel Hill: The Tree of Life
Synagogue Shooting and the Soul
of a Neighborhood
by Mark Opporhoimer

Squirrel Hill, Pittsburgh, is one of the oldest Jewish neighborhoods in the country, known for its tight-knit community and the profusion of multigenerational

families. On October 27, 2018, a gunman killed eleven Jews who were worshipping at the Tree of Life synagogue in Squirrel Hill – the most deadly anti-Semitic attack in American history. Many neighborhoods would be understandably subsumed by despair and recrimination after such an event, but not this one. Mark Oppenheimer poignantly shifts the focus away from the criminal and his crime, and instead presents the historic, spirited community at the center of this heartbreak. He speaks with residents and nonresidents, Jews and gentiles, survivors and witnesses, teenagers and seniors, activists and historians. Together, these stories provide a kaleidoscopic and nuanced account of collective grief, love, support, and revival. But Oppenheimer also details the difficult dialogue and messy confrontations that Squirrel Hill had to face in the process of healing, and that are a necessary part of true growth and understanding in any community. He has reverently captured the vibrancy and caring that still characterize Squirrel Hill, and it is this phenomenal resilience that can provide inspiration to any place burdened with discrimination and hate. Morningside Heights: A Novel by Joshua Henkin

When Ohio-born Pru Steiner arrives in New York in 1976, she follows in a long tradition of young people determined to take the city by storm. But when she falls in love with and marries Spence Robin, her

hotshot young Shakespeare professor, her life takes a turn she couldn't have anticipated. Thirty years later, something is wrong with Spence. The Great Man can't concentrate; he falls asleep reading The New York Review of Books. With their daughter, Sarah, away at medical school, Pru must struggle on her own to care for him. One day, feeling especially isolated, Pru meets a man, and the possibility of new romance blooms. Meanwhile, Spence's estranged son from his first marriage has come back into their lives. Arlo, a wealthy entrepreneur who invests in biotech, may be his father's last, best hope. Morningside Heights is a sweeping and compassionate novel about a marriage surviving hardship. It's about the love between women and men,

and children and parents; about the things we give up in the face of adversity; and about how to survive when life turns out differently from what we thought we signed up for. Can We Talk About Israel? A Guide for the About ISRAEL? Curious, Confused, and Conflicted by Daniel Sokatch

"Can't you just explain the Israel situation to me? In, like, 10 minutes or less?" This is the question Daniel Sokatch is used to answering on an almost daily basis as the head of the New Israel Fund, an organization dedicated to

equality and democracy for all Israelis, not just Jews, Sokatch is supremely well-versed on the Israeli conflict. Can We Talk About Israel? is the story of that conflict, and of why so many people feel so strongly about it without actually understanding it very well at all. It is an attempt to grapple with a century-long struggle between two peoples that both perceive themselves as (and indeed are) victims. And it's an attempt to explain why Israel (and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict) inspires such extreme feelings - why it seems like Israel is the answer to "what is wrong with the world" for half the people in it, and "what is right with the world" for the other half. As Sokatch asks, is there any other topic about which so many intelligent, educated and sophisticated people express such strongly and passionately held convictions, and about which they actually know so little? Complete with engaging illustrations by Christopher Noxon, Can We Talk About Israel? is an easy-to-read yet penetrating and original look at the history and basic contours of one of the most complicated conflicts in the world.
