The Power of Prayer

Henrietta Szold, the founder of Hadassah, once wrote in a letter to Haym Peretz:

The Kaddish means to me that the survivor publicly and markedly

manifests their wish and intention to assume the relation to the Jewish community which their parent had and that so the chain of tradition remains unbroken from generation to generation, each adding its own link."

Prayer makes emotion articulate. It gives us the words when there are no words. It provides sacred space for the tears that otherwise would have nowhere to go.

Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks proposed: "Daily prayer works on us in ways not immediately apparent. As the sea smooths the stone, as the repeated hammer blows of the sculptor shape the marble, so prayer - repeated, cyclical, tracking the rhythms of time itself - gradually wears away the jagged edges of our character, turning it into a work of devotional art, aligning it with the moral energies of the universe."

Often our prayers are spontaneous—prayers of gratitude, petition, longing, and awe. We seek appropriate words in moments of remarkable experiences, such as the birth of a child or the celebration of a relationship. So too, in times of great pain, such as the loss of a loved one - we search our hearts for words that articulate our profound and innermost feelings.

Fortunately, our tradition provides language that can support our emotions and give us the tools to publicly and personally acknowledge the gifts of life. Prayer can also strengthen us as we rely on the words of generations past - because power can come from expressions that are not our own.

There is a beautiful prayer we recite when we see a magnificent natural wonder, for example, the ocean, beautiful mountains, or a shooting star; it concludes: Oseh Ma'aseh Bereishit - Blessed is the Holy One who continues the act of creation. This bracha - blessing - exemplifies how our tradition supports our experiences. It is difficult to formulate the appropriate words when we are overcome with awe - this is precisely what set prayer does for us.

The 11th-century poet Judah Halevi taught: "It is to the soul what food is to the body. Starve the body of food, and it dies. Starve a soul of prayer, and it atrophies and withers."

Sometimes prayer is all the more powerful when the words are those that we connect with our history. The rabbis maintained that Mourner's Kaddish is a conversation between people and God and people and one another. It is the latter why we must recite the prayer in a quorum of ten Jewish people who have reached the age of majority. Prayer is not only more powerful when the words connect with memory and emotions; it is potentially more comforting when those on a similar journey surround us.

The reverberating call of "amen" is often one of the most impactful moments of the prayer service. May we each find ourselves comforted, supported, and uplifted by our prayers in the community - amen.

What Your Men's Club Does for You and the BHBE Community

The purpose of an auxiliary organization is to support and further the goals of the Synagogue as best it can. The following is a report on a majority of the activities of your Men's Club. The BHBE Men's Club is part of the Midwest Region of the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs (FJMC) with clubs in Milwaukee, Chicago, St. Louis, and other Midwestern cities. Your BHBE Men's Club organizes local programs and participates in Regional and National programs.

Charity Begins at Home - A disabled congregant with mobility issues was seeking as assistance with a few tasks around her home. The congregant approached several organizations and eventually approached the Men's Club. Harold Primack and Steven Bucksbaum worked together to help the congregant take out the recycling and the garbage, change a few light bulbs, replace batteries in the smoke detectors and a few other home maintenance tasks. This has been a multi-visit task. We have had to return several times to take out the garbage and the recycling. We would gratefully accept more volunteers, "many hands makes little work".

Tracing Family Roots: Dr. Michael Gideon - On October 30, 2022, about 80 people herd Dr. Michael Gideon speak of the trip his parents, siblings and children made to Germany to trace the family's roots back to where generations of the family had lived until they left Germany in the 1930s. Michael grew up in Wilmette and had his Bar Mitzvah here at BHBE. Jay Lawrence (Coordinator), Ivan Cramer, Gary Rubin, Dan Chodrow, Larry Plawsky all helped with food preparation and serving. Service on Short Notice - Dr. Ray Glassenberg responded to a request from the Chicago Mitzvah Campaign for people to provide transportation. The request was sent by email at 5:30am and Dr. Glassenberg responded within a few hours. Shabbat Packages prepared by Chicago Mitzvah Campaign for Hospital patients were delivered to Illinois Masonic Hospital, Shirley Ryan Ability Lab (downtown) and Northwestern University Hospital downtown. Symposium of Anti-violence Collaborative Groups On December 4, 2022, Men's Club sponsored a symposium of speakers from the Institute for Non Violence discuss their anti-violence program. From Miniskirt to Hijab: A Girl in Revolutionary Iran by Jacqueline Saper (2019)

Jacqueline Saper, named after Jacqueline Kennedy, was born in Tehran to Iranian and British parents. At eighteen she

witnessed the civil unrest of the 1979 Iranian revolution and continued to live in the Islamic Republic during its most volatile times, including the Iran-Iraq War. In a deeply intimate and personal story, Saper recounts her privileged childhood in pre-revolutionary Iran and how she gradually became aware of the paradoxes in her life and community—primarily the disparate religions and cultures. In 1979 under the Ayatollah regime, Iran became increasingly unfamiliar and hostile to Saper. Seemingly overnight she went from living a carefree life of wearing miniskirts and attending high school to listening to fanatic diatribes, forced to wear the hijab, and hiding in the basement as Iraqi bombs fell over the city. She eventually fled to the United States in 1987 with her husband and children after, in part, witnessing her six-year-old daughter's indoctrination into radical Islamic politics at school. At the heart of Saper's story is a harrowing and instructive tale of how extremist ideologies seized a Westernized, affluent country and transformed it into a fundamentalist Islamic society. Her story also sheds light on the current situation in Iran where women's protests have challenged the current regime. And some BHBE congregants may remember that the author was a teacher in the Academy a number of years ago. Winner: Chicago Writers Association 2020 Book of the Year Award




Jews Don't Count by David Baddiel (2021)

In Jews Don't Count, Jewish British comedian David Baddiel digs deeply into the subtle but pernicious form of antisemitism present today. Using examples from the literary world, the film

industry, sports, politics, and even the culinary world, he shows that antisemitism is alive and well, even among progressives who have admirably devoted themselves to social justice. The argument woven throughout the book is that there is a "hierarchy of racisms," which consistently places Judaism at the low end of the list of importance. The rules that apply to discourse about other ethnic minorities and marginalized groups do not seem to apply to Jews. Among those rules (which he details throughout the book) is that "those who do not

experience racism need to listen, to learn, to accept and not challenge, when others speak about their experiences. Except ... [n]on-Jews, including progressive non-Jews, are still very happy to tell Jews whether or not the utterance about them was in fact racist." Baddiel doesn't shy away from the thorniest questions. Is Judaism a religion or an ethnicity? When is it anti-Zionism and when is it antisemitism? In the context of racism, are Jews white? This is a book for "anti-racists, or at least, those who would claim to be so," as the author writes. But it is also a book for all of the Jews who have followed the evolution of identity politics with growing discomfort at the myriad ways in which this particular form of bigotry is not only tolerated but oftentimes unrecognized as bigotry at all. The deeply moving, propulsive story of ten teenagers brought together by a high school production of *The Diary of Anne Frank* that will shape and influence the rest of their lives. Evanston, Illinois, 1982. A group of students at a magnet high school

meet to audition for the spring play. They are eager for the chance to escape their difficult everyday lives. 2016. The actors have moved on with their lives. Some are wildly successful, some never left their hometown, and some just want to be left alone. Everything changes, however, when one former cast member comes forward with an allegation dating back to the time of the play. The consequences of this public revelation will be far-reaching and complex, reverberating through all of their lives in unexpected ways. "A page-turning novel that is by turns funny, despairing and even affirming, a complex and powerful mix." (*Chicago Tribune*)
