With the beginning of summer comes the excitement for many of our youth who will head off to overnight camp to celebrate the season with new and old friends. I often consider this time of year how it is that our youth find the confidence to head out on a new and

thrilling adventure.

A young student was once asked incredulously if he always wanted to be in 5th grade rather than move up in school. He answered: "yes, he did not want to move up in grades because then he would have to change teachers."

There is much wisdom and honesty in the young student's spontaneous reply.

The truth is that changes can be and are most often challenging in varying degrees and, at times, anxiety-provoking. To be courageous is to have the power to let go of the familiar.

Let's reflect on the moments of change in our lives beyond summer camp. When we stood under the huppah at our wedding ceremonies - moving from two individuals to one couple in the eyes of our tradition. The first time we brought our children to preschool - some clung tightly to us, not ready to let go of the familiar (and us clinging right back). Each year's first day of school. A move in location or profession. Seeing our children grow up so quickly before our eyes. We needed the courage and continue to cope with these changes.

Outside of our evolutions - we live in times of consistent change. For example, technological changes alone have profoundly revolutionized our style and pace of living. And even our values, morality, and religious beliefs and practices have not been unmoved by the howling winds of change.

At this time, we must be reminded of the things that remain the same. In the words of Ahab in Moby Dick, we "like to feel something in this slippery world that can hold."

It is in discovering the things we can always count on that we can find comfort.

The prolific American Rabbi Sydney Greenberg wrote:

The healing power of time and the sustaining power of hope; the heart's yearning for love and the soul's hunger for prayer; the endless quest for truth and the stubborn struggle for justice; the restless urge to create and the valiant will to overcome - these are some of the things we can count on. These are the things that hold in a slippery world.

TORAH Queeries

Library Lines

Educator Rudine Sims Bishop, described as the "mother" of multicultural children's literature, greatly influenced librarians and teachers with her description of books as windows (offering views of worlds that may be real or imagined, familiar or strange), sliding glass doors (allowing readers to become part of a world created by an author), and mirrors (enabling us to see our own lives and experiences as part of the greater human experience). In the past, neither Jewish nor LGBTQ+ readers-especially those who identify as both-found themselves well represented in mainstream literature. Luckily, in recent years there are more and more books where LGBTQ+ Jews and their families can see themselves mirrored, which means that others can have a window into their lives as well. Whether it's a nonfiction work of queer Jewish texts over the past two centuries, a memoir of a transgender rabbi, a young adult novel of same sex love, or a middle grade chapter book where a Jewish child has two moms, readers no longer need feel that they are not represented in the books they read.

In recognition of Pride Month this June, I am sharing resources available to access LGBTQ+ Jewish books for both adults and children. We have a growing collection in the BHBE library. Go to the online catalog and click on the LGBTQ+ Resources tab for a list of titles. You can find more children's titles on my colleague Heidi Rabinowitz' database of diverse Jewish kidlit, selecting Queer Jews from the Tags dropdown menu. For additional information, see the New York Public Library's LGBTQ+ Jewish page which includes a research guide that features publications by and about LGBTQ+ Jewish people, from scholarly and community works to personal stories.

I'm highlighting a few titles of interest below. In addition, a number of books on LGBTQ+ issues and with LGBTQ+ characters will be on display in the library during Pride Month and in the rotunda on Pride Shabbat on June 24. Please reach out to me with any questions or if you want any reading recommendations.

Torah Queeries: Weekly Commentaries on the Hebrew Bible by Gregg Drinkwater, Joshua Lesser, and David Shneer, with a forward by Judith Plaskow (2009)

This incredibly rich collection unites the voices of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and

straight-allied writers, including some of the most central figures in contemporary American Judaism. All bring to the table unique methods of reading and interpreting that allow the Torah to speak to modern concerns of sexuality, identity, gender, and LGBT life. *Torah Queeries* offers cultural critique, social commentary, and a vision of community transformation, all done through biblical interpretation. The New Queer Conscience by Adam Eli, illustrated by Ashley Lukashevsky (2020, Sydney Taylor Young Adult Notable Book)

A candid and compassionate introduction to queer responsibility. Eli calls on his Jewish faith to underline how kindness and support within

the queer community can lead to a stronger global consciousness. More importantly, he reassures us that we're not alone. (from the publisher)



All Three Stooges by Erica S. Perl (2018, Middle Grade Sydney Taylor Honor Book)

Noah, Dash, and Noa are grouped together for their B'nai Mitzvah tzedakah project. Noah can't stand Noa, a girl who annoyingly shares his name and B'nai Mitzvah date and seems to

do everything right. Dash and Noah are best friends who love sleepovers devoted to hanging out with Dash's dad watching old comedy routines, until... Dash's dad commits suicide. Then, everything falls apart. Noah loses his father figure, whom he needs because he has two loving, but somewhat ineffective moms. Dash becomes angry and depressed and pulls away from Noah and even therapy doesn't help. Noa relives the death of her own dad, for which she is still seeing a counselor. In his weekly meetings with the B'nai Mitzvah class, the rabbi talks about Torah and acts of loving kindness, but doesn't really help any of his students address their issues. As the tweens try to work through everything, often with humor, at times with immaturity, Perl gives us voices that ring true, believable situations, and a warm, loving story with more than a sprinkling of Judaism. The Flower Girl Wore Celery by Meryl G. Gordon, illustrated by Holly Clifton-Brown (2016, Preschool-Grade 2)

A fresh, delightful picture book presents a gay, Jewish wedding in positive family terms brimming with energy and love. The unex-

pected propels the plot. The opening of the book thrives on the humor of tots misunderstanding wedding roles. The children do not know what to imagine from the terms 'flower girl,' 'ring bearer,' and 'celery dresses.' When the bride and groom turn out to be two brides it is just one more mental picture to be adjusted. The synagogue marriage ceremony includes grandparents and siblings in the wedding party, parents bringing each bride down the aisle, a female rabbi, the *ketubah*, seven blessings, ring exchange, breaking of the wine glasses to shouts of Mazel Tov, and a hora danced in celebration as the brides are carried on their chairs.
