The Hanukkah dreidel is adorned with four Hebrew letters: Nun, Gimel, Hey, and Shin. Which represent the phrase: "A great miracle happened there." Throughout the holiday of Hanukkah, we perform acts and recite songs and prayers that

recognize that a great miracle happened in Israel thousands of years ago.

The Hanukkiah is a beautiful candelabra that the rabbinic sages taught was our religious responsibility to light during the Festival of Lights. Interestingly, according to the rabbis of our early rabbinic literature, the mitzvah is not only to illuminate the Hanukkiah; it is to share that light with the entire world. We do so by displaying the Hanukkah menorah in our most public windows so that as many people as possible can witness its luminosity. The rabbis were quick to teach that in a time of trouble, i.e., rampant antisemitism, it was sufficient to light the Hanukkiah in a less public place. They were always aware of the realities of Jewish life - especially outside of the Land of Israel, as the Rabbis lived in Babylonia.

Throughout the holiday, we recite prayers that extend our gratitude to the Divine for the miracles of the past and the miracles of today. However, what our prayers do not qualify is what the miracles of the past and today are; instead, the sacred words could be more explicit. Once again, we turn to our sages for their guidance. The Rabbis taught that there were two types of miracles that we acknowledge throughout the festival. The first is that a small group of inexperienced, ill-prepared, and barely armed fighters could defeat the solid Greek-Assyrian army. This, according to our tradition, was a reflection of God's miracles. The second miracle was that there was only enough sanctified and pure oil to light the menorah in the Temple for one day, yet it miraculously lasted eight days. In both rabbinic examples of ancient miracles, God played an essential role.

For thousands of generations, Jews have looked to our ancestors for strength and guidance. During our time, when our Jewish homeland is under the most significant existential threats since the Yom Kippur War, our Hannukah miracle narratives play essential roles. They encourage our faith in victory, no matter the odds stacked against us.

In the haftarah reading for Hannukah, we read: "Not by might, not by power, but by spirit alone, shall we all live in peace." May we have the might and power necessary to find success against evil. And may our spirit guide us toward pursuing and knowing peace.

Kol Nidre Speech

These are some reflections on transition, change and home: "Change" is an *event*, a moment in time — we move into a new home, we leave a job, we become a parent. "Transition" is the *process* that unfolds before, during, and after the change event. Transition affects us on physical, emotional, and psychological levels

and in this process, we are transformed. By bringing mindful attention to the transition process, it is more likely that we will be satisfied with the change we undertake.

I do not know where the expression, "Home is where the heart is" originated. Like many of you though, I certainly remember the scene in The Wizard of Oz when Dorothy clicks her heels together and says, "There's no place like home, there's no place like home."

A while back, I was on a Delta flight to Chicago—for all intents and purposes, heading home, yet my heart seemed confused, because it seemed to believe I had left it in Roslindale, Massachusetts with my three year old granddaughter, Charlie, my pregnant daughter, Rachel, and her husband AJ.

On my frequent trips to Skokie to visit my son Sam, his pregnant wife Katie, and my 4 year old grandson, my heart doesn't seem confused, a 20 minute drive, for all intents and purposes, is still part of my sweet home Chicago.

Which of course, brings me to another place that my heart feels at home, especially on this night, on Kol Nidrei. For certainly, like many of you, I feel at home when surrounded by close friends, and loved ones, by the clergy that guides us and by fellow BHBE congregants, performing rituals we've performed for decades, rituals which comfort and sustain us year to year—and which provide us with the rhythms of our lives. Is it their familiarity that adds to my feeling of "this is home."

My experience of home changes as I travel. "Change" is the *event*, a moment in time —when I arrive at my daughter's home. For many of us change is truly when we move into a new house, when we begin a new job, when our family grows. "Transition" is the *process* that unfolds before, during, and after these change events. Transition affects us on physical, emotional, and psychological levels and in this process, we are transformed. As I fly to Boston, I think about and become excited by all that awaits me; I go thru a transition from shul President, to Bubbe, from a busy meeting attending adult, to a loving gushing grandmother who has nothing more to do than care for my children and granddaughter. By paying mindful attention to this transition it is easy for me to assume my Boston role.

As we look around the sanctuary tonight, I am filled with memories of attending services here with family and with friends; of Bar and Bat Mitzvahs I attended with my children over 20 years ago, of their auf rufs only a few years ago.

Today, even as I speak, many of you may be wondering about this building, about our future. The changes that we may be facing. I recently read an article in the New York Times by Brad Stulberg, titled Stop Resisting Change. His basic premise is that most people have a fraught relationship with change, the result of which is almost always some combination of stress, anxiety, burnout and exhaustion. He states that to thrive in our lifetimes, and not just survive, we need to transform our relationship with change in favor of a new nimbleness, a means of viewing more of what life throws at us as something to participate in. We are always shaping and being shaped by change, often at the very same time. The brain is at its best when it is constantly rewiring itself and making new connections, what we experience as a thriving and stable consciousness is actually a process of on going change. It's about balancing acceptance with problem-solving and moving forward to a new normal.

Our Board members are currently making choices about our future, as President of the Board I am intimately involved in the choices and decisions that are being made as are our clergy and lay leaders. None of this is easy, we are not disinterested participants making plans for you; we are indeed very interested participants and we are making plans for our futures—for the future of our children and maybe our grand children. For b-mitzvahs and baby namings, for auf frufs and weddings.

About 60 years ago, when I would go to high holiday services with my parents and paternal grandfather, I sat between my mother and popop. I do not remember what the sanctuary looked like; I remember the scent of the rive gauche perfume my mother wore, and poppop putting in his hearing aids only to listen to our Rabbi's devar Torah. I do not remember what the sanctuary looked like, I remember being surrounded by love.

So as I look at the bricks and mortar of this building, the stained glass windows and the Ner Tamid, I realize that I cherish the people with whom I have shared memories; it is the people with whom I have shared so much of my life.

Please take a moment to look around, at your fellow congregants, at your family and friends who make this Kol Nidre special just by being here with you—the feelings of comfort, continuity, of belonging, the feelings of home that are so familiar to us all.

I truly believe many of us felt this connection very strongly last week as we listened to the shofar's tekiah gadolah—a sense of pride in our community, in our shofar blower, in sharing that moment with our community.

Home is where the heart is, tonight, BHBE is our home. And what is my hope for BHBE--It is my most sincere hope that in the year ahead, the years ahead, we continue to build strong bonds with each other.

That we remember our congregation is like a family, and no matter where we are, it can be our home. And that we continue to cherish our home, no matter where it may be. As we enter 5784, we are entering and transitioning to our new normal, may we go from strength to strength as we do so.
